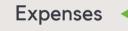

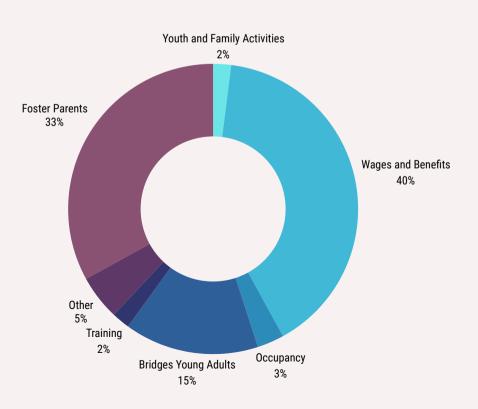

Revenue

Agape for Youth receives revenue from a number of sources. The primary funder is county and state contracts for services. Other sources include: grants, donations, and fundraising. Agape is very fortunate to have the amazing support of our community partners, counties and individual donors.

We ensure our families and young adults receive the financial monies which they are entitled to and ensure our staff receive a fair wage. Additional expenses include but not limited to: occupancy, training, IT services, youth and family activities and supports, and marketing/recruitment.

FY 24-25 Key Focus Areas

Over the next fiscal year, we are excited stabilize our programs and fiscal in a time of transition. With a changeover in leadership, this next fiscal year is about creating financial stability, recruitment of families, board development and creative thinking as a team.

Financial Stability: Securing our Future

We are committed to restoring and strengthening the financial health of our organization. This year, we took meaningful steps to grow enrollment in our Bridges program while strategically reducing operational expenses. These efforts are part of a broader initiative to "right our financial ship"—with the goal of emerging from debt and establishing a strong investment account that will provide long-term security and flexibility. By aligning our resources with our mission, we are ensuring that our work can continue—and expand—for generations to come.

Creative Thinking and Technology: Innovating from the Inside Out

To better serve our community, we must continually evolve. This year, we embraced innovation through restructuring our leadership team and reimagining how we collaborate. 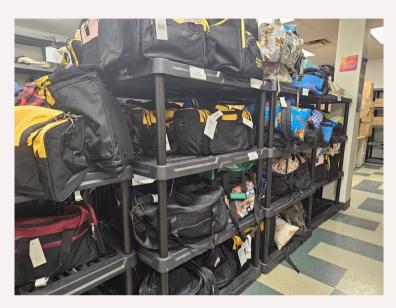
